12 TIPS TO OVERCOME DISAPPOINTMENT AT JOB ENVIRONMENT

Disappointment is a fact that all academicians have faced at one stage or another. Nevertheless, at early phases of academic professionals, handling disappointment is a decisive challenge. Active, enthusiastic faculty member applies for a grant, but failed to get approval! Submits manuscript to an average medical journal and got rejected! Pulled into unexplainable dispute with close colleagues! Demanding work versus salary cuts! How to get out of such disappointing situations?!

Tip #1: We overcome disappointment when we first and foremost, realize that it is normal to come across disapproval, rejection, and conflict situations in the job environment! In fact, it is not unique to academic environment, but it is there in all professions and careers.

Tip #2: As soon as you feel disappointed, look for the main underlying cause. If your grant proposal for instance below expectations, look into rejection as a chance to improve.

Tip #3: Avoid being isolated and living in an island.

Tip #4: Taking negative people's thoughts and advices are far worse than isolation! Hence, to get out of that bad feeling go and circle with positive people, they are everywhere.

Polypharmacy and Diabetes Distress

Worldwide 6% of the population are affected by diabetes mellitus and the projection for the year 2030 is 438 million. Diabetes mellitus is emerging as a significant health problem in Sudan due to the adoption of obesogenic diet and work involving physical inactivity; this chronic morbid disease is on the rise in Sudan. By the year 2000, half million people were affected by diabetes mellitus and expected to reach one million in

the year 2030 according to the World Health Organization. Diabetes mellitus is a significant burden both emotionally and financially to the affected person and the whole community. The hyperglycemic complication of diabetes mellitus can be avoided by the rational use of antidiabetic medications and insulin. The sound use of drugs is defined as: the patients receive medications appropriate to their clinical needs, in doses that meet their individual requirements for an adequate period and at the lowest cost to them and their community.

Diabetes distress is the reaction (it captures concerns, worries and fear, not necessarily a co-morbid) to a demanding chronic disease like diabetes mellitus; it is content related, imply etiology and distinguish between different causes. The 2050 projection for people aged ≥65 years worldwide is 1.5 billion (nearly triple the number in 2010), the increasing number of aging population coupled with chronic diseases and polypharmacy is a global health burden physically, mentally and financially. Polypharmacy which is defined as administration of five or more drugs had been linked to unfavorable health outcomes including unwanted medications side effects, falls, increasing hospitalization, dementia and death with deleterious consequences on health authorities, the patients and the community as a whole. An optimal prescription to patients and particularly patients with diabetes is of paramount importance. To our best of knowledge, our survey is the first to study the relation of polypharmacy to diabetes distress among patient with type 2 diabetes mellitus in Sudan.
